PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Stubbornly Evangelistic, With a Cost

How committed are you to the Lord and to His Church? Under what circumstances does your gospel fervor rise or fall?

During Sunday worship since the beginning of the year we have been studying the First Letter of Peter. In his letters, Peter instructed early Christians as regards the conduct of their relationships within the Church and outside the church. Peter wrote at a time when being Christian and the Church was increasingly difficult. Opposition was growing from various sectors.

What appears below is an excerpt from an article "Crossing the Line in China" that appeared in the May 2010 issue of *The Voice of the Martyrs* magazine. The whole story is a bit long to re-print but I think upon reading the excerpt you will be pressed as I was to evaluate how stubbornly evangelistic (or not) you are or would be for the Gospel. Praise God that we are not threatened by the government with closure, but we do have to admit that lesser things are pulling the Lord's people away from a faithful and obedient practice of the faith. May the Lord strengthen our Gospel conviction.

Crossing the Line

"The Linfen Church was founded in the city of Linfen more than 100 years ago. In 1949, it was forcibly absorbed into the TSPM (originally called the Anti-American Aid to (North) Korea Three Self Renewal Movement). At that time, the communists led by Mao Zedong eliminated all church denominations. However, by the 1970's the stubbornly evangelistic Linfen Church had about 1,000 members. It was during this time that a dynamic couple named Wang Xiaoguang and Yang Rongli, Esther's uncle and aunt, joined Linfen Church.

"Their son, Wang Yunxiang, said, "Father and Mother naturally became members of the local church and participated in the church activities. Because of their talents and loyalty to God, they played a more and more important role in church, and their efforts were recognized by fellow believers."

"In 1979 the church left the TSPM and joined the millions of believers who worshiped outside the state-sanctioned religious system. "When Linfen Church separated from the Three Self Church, I was a grade-two pupil in primary school and witnessed many incidents during this earthshaking event." said Wang Yunxiang. "My parents did not tell me the details of the event or the theological theories. But now, I understand: they merely wanted to find a way out...There were over 1,000 believers under the Linfen Church. They all left with the preachers. Now the number of believers has risen more than 10 times. Clearly God is with us.

"Wang Xiaoguang and Yang Rongli eventually became leaders of the whole network, which had more than 30 church buildings around Linfen, a city about the size of Los Angeles. Pastor Wang Xiaoguang preferred to shoulder the responsibility of preaching and studying Scripture, while his wife, Yang Rongli, undertook administrative and leadership duties.

"The Linfen Church enjoyed its status as a "Liberated Zone" for so many years in part because of the way church leaders interacted with government officials. When authorities interfered with church activities, such as raiding Christian funeral services or monitoring church services, church leaders made appointments with city officials and told them they could not harass the believers. 'You don't expect (the communist officials) will give you freedom to worship,' Esther says. 'You need to fight with them.

If you are strong, they are weak.' However the state was simply watching and waiting, the Linfen Church in their sights.

"Several years ago, the church held an evangelistic outreach in the countryside. They built a huge stage complete with microphones and speakers. They also provided lunch and dinner to the 20,000 attendees. Esther and her friends noticed a man discreetly recording the event. When they asked him about it, he ran away, and they realized he was a government spy.

"City officials later told the church they were not allowed to hold another such activity. Church leaders again complained to officials and continued to gather. "We are also afraid we are also scared, because they are the authority," Esther says. "They have the privilege to arrest us, but we needed to defend our faith. We needed to show other people, the unbelievers, that we have faith." But standing strong in their faith soon brought the wrath of the Chinese government. They had crossed the line, and the communist government would take no more.

The Raid

"By 2009, Linfen city officials had seen enough of the vibrantly growing church, and the national government pressured the city to do something about its "religious problem." china's communist government, suspicious of any independent group that might challenge its authority, was worried by the expansion of Christianity.

"At the time, the Linfen network was constructing a church building in a suburb of the city called Fushan County, and a number of church members were sleeping in the unfinished building while they helped with construction. The property which was owned by a believer also housed the church-owned factory complex of the Good News Cloth Shoes Factory.

"In the early morning hours of Sunday, Sept. 13, the sleeping church members were jolted awake by the sounds of intruders and bulldozers. A mixed mob of 400 police officers, local government officials and hired thugs entered the compound with shovels, batons, bricks

hooks and other weapons, wearing arm bands to identify themselves to each other, the mob began to beat the sleeping church members. Two front-loaders demolished the unfinished church and 17 of the factory buildings. Among the more than 100 church members hurt in the raid, more than 20 were severely injured. Local officials instructed the hospitals not to give the victims blood transfusions. When church members surveyed the massive destruction, they saw that TV's, refrigerators and appliances had been looted or smashed and that personal belongings, including money, Bibles and church documents, had been pilfered or destroyed.

"Yet on Monday, Sept. 14, 2009, the sound of bulldozers had been replaced by the sweet sound of singing, as more than 1,000 church members gathered in pouring rain to pray".

**Report from the Youth Life Foundation
Ke'Asia at the Mentor Awards**

Ke'Asia is ten years old and is in the 5th grade. She has had a lot to deal with in her life, as many of our kids have. Her mother died when she was just a

baby; but thankfully, her grandmother has been there to raise her.

When Ke'Asia first started with us last year she was often distrusting, self-conscious, and hard. She wouldn't hesitate to tell us or her mentors to "get out of my face" or "shut up" when corrected. She would burst out in tirades of frustration and anger.

A year and a half later, Ke'Asia is a different child, as evidenced at the banquet. A child that was self-conscious about her appearance and was too nervous to perform or speak in front of others stood before a crowd of grownups and confidently read the speech she had written. She beautifully expressed her appreciation to all the mentors who have so positively influenced her life. Then she spoke of one in particular, and in doing so, she expressed the hunger of every child. She spoke of the memory of Miss Mary that she would never forget - Miss Mary telling Ke'Asia that she loved her and that she believed in her. As Ke'Asia read this part of her speech, she broke and stopped reading and cried and then she finished.

There was a lifetime of growth evident in that one moment. First, Ke'Asia was speaking in front of that crowd, now possessing the confidence to believe in herself. Second, the tough exterior of a child whose life has been too hard, too soon, was washed away by a flood of love that she had both received and felt. We saw in its place, the tender heart that has been there all along, that God placed within her in when He formed her in the womb.

Third, Ke'Asia was not ashamed to be who she was in her vulnerability. In the hood that vulnerability will get you beat down. But in that moment she knew she was safe and secure to be real. Last of all, she finished. She could have quit. She could have just given up right there and walked off the stage, but she was determined to read to the very last word on her paper. She had been given the heart of an overcomer, one who doesn't quit when live gets too hard or feels too uncomfortable.

MISSIONARY UPDATES

Report from Richard and Carol Mears, in Haiti June 12, 2010

The World Cup has begun and millions of Americans have watched the US battle England today on their big screen TV's. But in Haiti, millions of people do not own television sets, let alone the "home entertainment" systems so popular in the US now.

So, thanks to some visionary donors, I purchased 5 video projectors on my last trip to the US and now we are using them to show the World Cup games to hundreds of people, as well as share the Gospel with them.

Our strategy is simple: We ask members of the churches we are working with to invite a non-Christian friend to watch the game with them, and then give them a beautiful booklet that explains who Jesus is that is specially made for the World Cup 2010. Each church member then follows up with their friend and does friendship evangelism with them. Since there are 64 matches, each match we encourage different members of the church to bring a friend, thereby exposing the maximum number of people to the Gospel.

So far we have 3 installations up and working and by next week we hope to have a total of 7 in place before the end of next week (using two old projectors I had in Haiti already).

Today we got permission to use a large room under "Place Jeremie", a large public park where they play all of Haiti's Futsal games. We are going to show the matches each day and do evangelism with the help of members of Tabernacle Church, one the largest UEBH churches in Port-au-Prince.

This morning I got a call from my CrossWorld supervisor informing me that Richard had been robbed early this morning while he and a co-worker, Debreus, were loading equipment onto a bus to be taken up north for the World Cup Outreach.

He was shot in the leg during the robbery. The bullet went right through (and out of) his thigh.

He is going to be OK, but will be coming up here to Pennsylvania to recover. It seems that God was already working in that a stranger drove him to a Doctors Without Borders hospital and he has already had an xray. The doctors could see that no bones were broken and no artery was hit. He is getting good care and the doctors will advise our mission director, David Schmid, who has been with Richard for the past few hours, how and when he can travel up here.

I was going to go down there to help him make the trip, but David advised me to wait. He said that most likely one of the missionaries down there could accompany him to Pennsylvania.

We are bit shook up, of course, but our pastor, friends and co-workers have been really supportive.

We would appreciate your prayers for Richard, he's in some pain and was pretty traumatized. Please pray for These arrangements.
